

WELCOME TO THE LOFT'S 2023 YOUNG WRITERS' PROGRAM!

Welcome back to Summer Youth at Open Book! We are so excited for our summer programs to return to our center, and we are eager to create new memories with students. A hub for writers, Open Book will provide a meaningful setting for burgeoning writers and their huge imaginations. Summer Youth welcomes the young person wanting to discover their voice, and create writing that is meaningful to them and their community!

For 2023, we've split the summer into four themes to capture the imaginations of all young writers. The most asked-for genre last summer was horror, which was not a shock to me after last summer when many of our brilliant writers shared their positively creepy and skin-crawling stories. So for Week One, "Unreal! Sci-Fi, Fantasy, Horror" will offer outlets for the otherworldly. And because fantastical worldbuilding is so popular with Summer Youth students, Week Four "Spectacular Worlds" will round out our summer with even more expansive and magical creativity. For Week Two, "Young Novelists: Fiction Writing" will honor young writers as Writers—real participants in artmaking through serious (and seriously fun) fiction writing classes.

Perhaps our most highly-anticipated and exciting theme will come in Week Three. "Express Yourself! Narrative Power" will bring young writers into the fold of our organization-wide theme of "Narrative Power." This year, we've been exploring how writers exercise narrative power to lead and influence movements for social change. Who better to flex the muscles of movement-making than our Summer Youth students? We're thrilled to offer classes that ask students to think about building futures, to cultivate joy, and to celebrate community, all while exploring power, problems, and possibilities in the personal, public, and planetary.

Like last summer, we've organized most of our week-long classes to fill out a full day of creative writing fun. We've broken our classes into grade levels (grades 1-3, 4-6, 7-9, 10-12) to best represent the reading and writing levels of each group. Each young writer should register for the grade level they are entering in the fall—a great summer preview for their upcoming school year!

We have deep gratitude for our community of teaching artists, students, and parents for their flexibility and creativity. We welcome young writers whose imaginations are uncontainable, whose notebooks are bursting to the seams, whose unique voice deserves a mainstage! Whether you have plans of publishing your own book or are casual about creativity, we can't wait to have you join us this season for Summer Youth at Open Book!

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

Registration

Registration is open as long as there is space available in a class. You can register your child or teen online at www.loft.org or by calling 612-379-8999. We are here to help. A detailed confirmation letter will be emailed once your registration has been processed. Please note that you will be asked to fill out a Health and Safety form after registering, which will be included as a link in your confirmation letter.

Grade Ranges and Writing Ability

The grade ranges listed for each class are suggested guidelines, but before registering your child for a class outside of their grade range, please consider that teaching artists propose classes based on age ranges they are comfortable teaching. Suggested grade ranges also consider socialization, as well as more mature class discussions; you may have an incredibly gifted child who excels at writing and learning, but please consider whether they would be comfortable in a class with children much older/younger, comfortable participating in more mature class discussions pertaining to writing for older audiences, and how it would affect the learning environment for the other students. Please note that grade levels reflect the grade the student will be entering in the fall. If you have questions please call **612-379-8999**.
